Into India: Solidarity at its best

In 1951, six young Australian Jesuits answered the call of the Father General of the Society of Jesus and set sail to India to establish a foreign mission. During the 1950s and 1960s, a further 50 Jesuits from Australia and New Zealand (mostly in their early 20s, some not yet fully fledged priests) joined this young mission. Many believed they would never see family or friends again.

These young missionaries were inspired by Jesus and the life of Ignatius to travel to the frontiers of our world, walking alongside the poor and vulnerable. They were courageous, faith-filled and pioneering; they have left an indelible mark on hundreds of thousands of individuals and communities across India, enhancing their lives.

I had the privilege of spending two weeks visiting Jesuit works in Hazaribag earlier this year, and witnessed the extraordinary achievements of the past 66 years. Today, the Hazaribag mission has 180 Jesuits (including 10 Australians and one New Zealander). In partnership with dozens of

religious congregations and hundreds of lay collaborators, the Jesuits serve some of India's most vulnerable communities, including the Santali and Dalits, through a diverse range of social, pastoral, health and educational works.

But this mission was not created alone. Our family of Jesuit supporters and companions across Australia have been its life-blood over the past six decades. You are crucial co-missionaries: your prayers, financial generosity, letters of encouragement, mission visits and organisation of countless fundraising events and appeals have developed, nurtured and sustained this mission.

Through your generosity and international solidarity, 27,000 young people are being educated every year in more than 65 Jesuit primary, secondary and tertiary education institutions and in village-based learning centres. Strong and faithful parish communities have been formed in Hazaribag. Villagers are participating in micro-credit and financial literacy programs. Women are empowered to take leadership

roles in village initiatives, and families better understand the value of education for their children.

While our brothers and sisters in Hazaribag, through the work of the Jesuits and your generous support, are being given opportunities to live fuller and free lives, there is still much more to be done not only in India but also in other parts of the world. We share more of our Jesuit partners' inspiring work in this edition of Jesuit Mission News.

Disturbing the Dust: Receiving more than we give

Fr Tony Herbert SJ is currently collaborating with Jesuit Mission on the publication of his second book, *Disturbing the Dust*. Since 1965 he has been living and working in India among some of the world's most marginalised people; this book shares his personal reflections on his experiences and challenges of moving among communities of people on the edges of society.

Fr Tony notes: "These pages reflect an experience of the human spirit unfolding in

the villages of the indigenous people, and the song we tried to sing together. This experience generated feelings and insights that have been rich beyond measure."

The book's title came to Fr Tony when he realised how much he was learning from those whose world he entered. "I receive more than I give, disturbing the dust of my own ignorance and complacency."

In *Disturbing the Dust*, Fr Tony invites you to experience "the pleasure of living relationships in a living community of people on the edges; the energy, the vision, the wisdom which those people inspire; the challenge of creatively addressing their social problems; the joy in

discovering a new depth in the meaning of the Gospel, and in discovering the myriad faces of God."

You can create a Joyful world

Most families living in Thingangyun township in Myanmar are poor, and face discrimination due to their tribal group or ethnic background. Romona, 21, grew up in Rakhine State, where political, ethnic and religious tensions and conflict have paralysed the lives and futures of hundreds of thousands of people. Now living in Thingangyun, her family is very vulnerable; they have no identity papers, and this prevents them from living full and free lives.

Romona has experienced and witnessed more violence and tragedy in her young life than anyone should in a lifetime. But she saw the opportunity to join the Jesuit-run Oxon English Language Institute in Thingangyun as a new beginning. The school, which started in 2010, provides ninety 17-30-year-olds annually with English language programs in three levels. And more: with support from Jesuit Mission and our Australian Jesuit family, the Jesuits in Myanmar have created a holistic education program that develops the whole person, forming confident leaders, and men and women for others. The school supports students to grow in confidence, self-esteem, knowledge and skills through social development, drama, life skills and pastoral care activities.

Since she joined the program, Romona has developed a new passion for life. The school has exceeded her expectations – she has learnt so much more than English. Her favourite class is the life-skills course, which has given her confidence and is supporting her on a healing journey. Myanmar's Jesuit Socius, Fr Vinny Joseph SJ, teaches Romona's evening class.

He addresses his students: "I respond to you from my heart with a few drops of tears...

As a human being you are called to live a joyful, peaceful, happy life... I would like to give all of you peace, joy and love. But God has created it in such a way that it can't be given by another person. It has to be created by you. So we are like an instrument. We are like a fire creating the fire... You are assured that you can create a better world, you can create a joyful world; you can make yourself and the community much, much better."

The Jesuits are the only major organisation serving and accompanying the most marginalised families in Thingangyun's slum area. Existing projects include shelter construction, providing welcoming learning and study environments, and improving access to quality education. They are also expanding into microcredit loans and opening a community college.


A symbol of strength and hope

Randa is from Syria. Once a refugee, she now has a home in Baalbek, Lebanon. Randa describes 11 April 2017 as the happiest day of her life, when she launched her book at the Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) Social Education Centre in Baalbek. The book launch was part of a graduation ceremony, where 53 women received certificates for successfully completing a JRS course in English, computer literacy or make-up.

The courses have transformed the graduates' lives. Randa's story, "Arragheef Alyabes" ("The Dry Bread"), recounts the suffering and deprivation she and her family, like many others in Syria, have experienced. This story for children aims to create awareness of displacement, and the understanding that food is a basic right for everyone.

For more than a year Randa has been associated with JRS, which runs programs in 50 countries, assisting asylum seekers and refugees with education, emergency assistance, healthcare, livelihood activities and social services. Jesuit Mission is currently supporting JRS Lebanon in educating Syrian refugees in Baalbek.

Randa has successfully completed both the computer and English courses, and her sons have been able to access academic coaching. She has inspired many others. Nada El Myr, Project Director of JRS Baalbek, says: "Randa symbolises, for all of us, strength and hope. A great example of a woman who achieves her goals, in spite of much difficulty and suffering. Someone who is helping make this world a better place."



A centre for building friendships and lives

In April, a new Pastoral Centre to serve poor displaced families opened in Da Nang, Vietnam. The solidarity of our community of supporters, made it possible for Jesuit Mission to assist with funding the centre's construction and furnishings. The Centre will provide space for training, activities, social services and pastoral care for over 250 families who have migrated to Da Nang and are living in poverty and struggling with daily life.

At the centre's opening ceremony, Bishop Joseph Dang Duc Ngan (pictured below) said: "This project is the magnificent evidence of commitment of Jesuits to the marginalised people in Da Nang. I wish the pastoral centre will become the common home where the poor enrich their dignity and their relationships through participation in a holistic services program."

His wishes were echoed by Fr Phuc, Chair of Social Ministry Committee of Jesuit Vietnam Province: "The pastoral centre not only offers social services to the poor in need, but also empowers them to improve their quality of life. By raising awareness of human dignity, promoting values and

training in work skills, the project aims to develop the community's human capital."

At the ceremony, both old and young expressed their gratitude and their hopes:

"This pastoral centre not only helps us to build our friendship, but also helps us to build our life. We learn a lot of good things from here, such as how to work together, how to serve one another ... Many thanks to generous benefactors who donated."
