Our Story

A history of service


Education has been a priority for Jesuit Mission since the first Australian Jesuits travelled to Hazaribag, India in 1951.

Compelled by the spirit of Ignatius, these six young Jesuits established the first Australian mission, and began a long-term commitment to serve the most disadvantaged people in the community – the tribal and Dalit people (formerly known as 'untouchables' in the Indian caste system).

Supported by donations from people at home, the Australian Jesuits set about addressing the basic needs of the tribal and Dalit people (focusing especially on the needs of vulnerable women and children) and started their first make-shift school.

In the early days, classes were attended by a handful of children from Kolkata and the children of mine workers in Bihar State. Over time, the mission grew, and throughout the 1950's and 60's a further 49 Australian Jesuits were missioned to Hazaribag.

Now, over 70 years later, there are more than 150 Indian Jesuits in the Hazaribag Province. We have helped establish 65 Jesuit schools and two tertiary institutions that offer transformational education to 25,000 largely tribal and Dalit students each year. At the same time, across Hazaribag, the Jesuits' 12 parishes assist 694 villages with social services including legal aid and advocacy for workers' rights.



Jesuit Mission

Today...

As work in Hazaribag continued, by the early 2000's the Australian Jesuits found their mission of service expanding to people experiencing poverty and injustice in countries outside India, including Timor-Leste, Cambodia, Thailand, China and Indonesia.

Today, we actively work with local Jesuits in more than 10 countries primarily throughout South East Asia, and continue to prioritise our long-term, transformational work in India to meet continuing need.

We have also raised over one million dollars to support global crises through our Emergency Action Fund such as supporting refugees in Ukraine and victims of the 2023 earthquake in Turkey and Syria.

Thanks to the support of our generous donors, we provide financial support, community development expertise and capacity building across a diverse range of programs that help disenfranchised people develop the skills and resilience they need to create better futures for themselves, their families and communities.


Unlike many international development organisations, we rely on the generosity of our Australian supporters. Without their compassionate donations we would be unable to do the work we do, accompanying the most vulnerable members of our global family.

Detailed strategic planning and research means that we responsibly steward the funds of our kind supporters to maximise the impact for vulnerable people in the countries where we work.

We will continue to work across the sectors of education, disability, housing, sustainable livelihoods and agriculture, food security, health, water and sanitation, environment/ecology, capacity building and refugees and the displaced.

Over the next five years, we aim to invest \$25 million across programs in more than 10 countries to meet the growing needs of our most marginalised sisters and brothers.

Education

Every child has the right to an education

With education comes greater employment options, better health outcomes and the opportunity to uplift yourself, your community – even your society.

Yet, as our vulnerable sisters and brothers living in marginalised communities continue to experience injustice, inequity and poverty, the gap between the level of quality education children need and the level of education they're currently receiving remains significant.

Over five years we aim to raise over \$10 million for education projects in 7+ countries reaching more than 175,000 people.

The Jesuits have a deep, centuries-long connection to education.

Founder of the Jesuits, Ignatius of Loyola (later St. Ignatius) was an avid believer in education and a passionate, life-long learner. He devoted many years to his own university education, despite starting at an age when most students had already completed their studies.

The Jesuits became the first religious order of the Catholic Church to undertake formal education as a major ministry, when in 1548 – at the request of the citizens of Messina, Italy – they opened the first Jesuit school for lay students.

Today there are over 3,000 Jesuit education institutions around the world.

Creating meaningful change

For Jesuit Mission, empowering vulnerable children, women and men through education has been a priority since our inception in 1951, when we supported the Australian Jesuits' foundational mission to work with marginalised people in India.

Today, our incredible supporters continue to transform the lives of vulnerable people through education programs run by Jesuits in more than seven countries. The majority of our projects have a core focus on improving access to quality education in primary, secondary, tertiary and vocational training settings.

Education projects supported by Jesuit Mission immediately impact and create opportunities for program participants, with the positive effects rippling through their families, the wider community, families and generations to come.



Over 600 million children and adolescents worldwide are unable to attain minimum proficiency levels in reading and mathematics.



Nearly 1 in 3 adolescent girls from the poorest households around the world have never set foot in a classroom.



Children in fragile, conflict-affected countries are more than twice as likely to be out of school compared with those in countries not affected by conflict.

Our Targets: Education

- Increase each year the number of students who can access mainstream education through Jesuit schools, for those living on the margins, ethnic minorities, refugees and people with a disability.
- 2. **Increase** Jesuit Mission funded Scholarships for students who would otherwise not receive an education.



The Ankur Project, India

"The most dramatic result I have seen is the change of mentality, from 'not us, we can't' to 'see, we also can," said Fr Tony Herbert SJ. "We will avoid a whole generation slipping back into illiteracy."

In India, Dalit people – previously known as the 'untouchable' caste – have endured centuries of social exclusion that's left them extremely vulnerable and disenfranchised.

For over 70 years, Jesuit Mission has been working to uplift and empower the Dalit people in Hazaribag, India through quality education. (See page 4).

Now, in the wake of long school closures due to COVID-19, the Jesuits in Hazaribag have responded swiftly and effectively to launch the 'Ankur Project' – opening 120 Tuition Centres across six Hazaribag Jesuit Parishes to re-engage Dalit children who've fallen behind due to their long absence from school.

Thanks to the ongoing support of our Jesuit Mission community, the 'Ankur Project' Tuition Centres have been able to provide transformative education to over 7,500 Dalit children. In every Tuition centre, classes are small, so students enjoy individualised attention that helps them study at their own pace.

In most instances tutors are from the same communities as the children they teach. For Devi, a highly respected tutor working at the Mastratu village Tuition Centre, it's been an opportunity to work with children in her community to ensure they're not left behind after many years of disruption to their education.

"This program has brought life to the children," says Devi. "Whatever opportunity I will get to serve others, I will take it up."

Xavier Jesuit School, Cambodia

"Education is the key to helping students out of their poverty. Without education they will become unskilled labourers. But if they have a dream, then they have a goal and a purpose and an aim. We try to help them dream big." – Fr Quyen Vu SJ, Australian Provincial and former Director of Xavier Jesuit School.

There is an education crisis affecting millions of young people in Cambodia. One in four Cambodian students finish high school – even fewer in rural communities – and the poor standard of education means most students completing Grade 6 are not able to read or write.

Although it's been over 40 years since the surrender of the Khmer Rouge, Cambodia is one of the poorest countries in the world, struggling with vastly inadequate healthcare and education infrastructure.

To help create tangible, generational change, the Jesuits in Cambodia founded the Xavier Jesuit School in 2015. The school strives to empower students, strengthening their hearts and minds so they can learn, grow and contribute to the new future of Cambodian society.

The school is committed to serving the most vulnerable and offers complete scholarships that provide tuition, food and accommodation.

Most scholarship students, like Vy, say that if they weren't at Xavier Jesuit School they would not be at school at all. In the three years since receiving her scholarship, Vy has developed new confidence and has blossomed into one of the top performing students in her class.

Vy now has her sights set on a future as a lawyer, so she can help defend the rights of the vulnerable. "I am so grateful to Xavier Jesuit School for allowing students from poor families like me to dare to dream of a brighter future," she says.



Instituto São João de Brito (ISJB), Timor-Leste



"Like Nelson Mandela said, 'education is the most powerful weapon which we can use to change the world.' From education we can create more opportunity."

In Timor-Leste around half the population lives below the poverty line. With only 25% of teachers in schools properly trained, the quality of education is very poor and only half of the adult population is literate.

Seeing this urgent need for qualified teachers who can educate young people and help break the cycle of poverty, the Jesuits in Timor-Leste established the Instituto São João de Brito (ISJB) – a teacher training institute that's transforming the lives of graduates and their communities.

Students at ISJB earn a Bachelor's degree in education and are given well-rounded training that prepares them to be highly-skilled, ethical professionals who can take the lead in Timorese education and serve in areas of most need.

One of those students is Jesuina (20). The eldest of five siblings, Jesuina graduated from the Jesuit secondary school, Loyola College in Timor-Leste. Then, as part of an alumni program funded by a Jesuit Mission supporter, she's been awarded an allowance that contributes to school-related costs at ISJB.

Jesuina plans to return to her community in Dili once she has completed her ISJB training as an English teacher. "I hope I can be a good teacher and a quality teacher that can make a change for my country," she says.

Refugees & the Displaced

As a result of conflict, violence, persecution and human rights violations, over 89 million people worldwide have been forced to flee their homes.

More than half of these are people who have been internally displaced and are still living within the borders of their home country, while around 27 million are refugees, seeking a new beginning in a new country.

To look at that statistic another way, there's currently a greater number of refugees globally than there are people in Australia - and more than half of them are children and young people under 18.

Jesuit Mission is strongly committed to supporting people who are displaced, seeking asylum or are refugees throughout the world.

Over five years we aim to raise \$4 million to provide ongoing programs directly benefiting 100,000 refugees and displaced people to support education, livelihoods and skills training, psychosocial and physical health, and essential supplies. In turn, individuals and families will build skills and resilience that benefits them now and into the future.

The Jesuits have a long history of responding to refugees in need. In 1980 Fr Pedro Arrupe SJ urgently contacted Jesuit superiors around the world to support the thousands of families fleeing Vietnam in search of a better life.

As a result, Fr Arrupe founded Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS).

Today JRS is one of our companions in a global network that has close ties to local communities across the world, which means we're often uniquely well placed to respond to the needs of individuals and families who've been forced to flee their homes to escape war, conflict, persecution, human rights violations or natural disasters.

With the generous support of our Jesuit Mission community we're able to walk with our most vulnerable sisters and brothers, offering immediate, practical help in times of crisis, and ongoing care that helps people recover and rebuild their lives.



1 in every 88 people on earth have been forced to flee their home.



Around 23% of Jesuit Mission funding annually goes to projects that support refugees and displaced people in camps, detention centres and in the community.

Our Targets: Refugees and the Displaced

- 1. Ensure ongoing and improved access to basic services, education, livelihood and skills development for refugees and displaced people.
- 2. Provide essential support to 100,000+ refugees and displaced people.





'Befriend Towards Dignity During Refuge' project, Indonesia



"For the first time in my life, I received something from someone whom I don't have to give anything in exchange." - A program participant, awaiting resettlement in Indonesia.

As a result of international government policies, asylum seekers and refugees in Indonesia have been forced into poverty and despair. Hundreds of families are forced to sleep on the streets, fending for themselves with no money and no support from the Indonesian government.

Jesuit Mission supports local partner Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) Indonesia to run the vital 'Befriend Towards Dignity During Refuge' project, that assists refugees and asylum seekers in Indonesia to find safety and dignity.

JRS works with refugees living in Bogor and Jakarta, providing the basic essentials to survive - including financial support for food, rent, and access to health services - as well as ongoing physical and psychosocial support.

The program also empowers refugees through livelihood assistance activities - including English classes, cooking classes and education programs – which can open up opportunities and give them hope as they endure the protracted wait for resettlement.

"After receiving assistance our life is better than before. Not only for me, but for my children. I can manage our expenses and our food. My husband has also regained his health," said one of the refugees participating in the program.

While assisting refugees directly, the program also aims to promote the protection of refugees' human rights in Indonesia, and raise awareness of the current unjust policies and practices in place.

Sustaining Education for Burmese Refugees, Northern Thailand



Over 10,000 people living in the Mae Hong Son Refugee Camps are ethnic Karenni people who were forced to flee Myanmar to escape armed conflict, persecution and human rights abuses.

Daily life in the two Mae Hong Son Refugee Camps is tough. Access to education is very limited and movement outside the camps is restricted for refugees, so it's impossible to earn a livelihood. This means camp-dwellers are pushed into extreme poverty.

It's in these challenging circumstances that our local partner Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) Asia-Pacific has developed a program to bring education – and new hope – to 3,000 children growing up in the Mae Hong Son camps.

With the committed support of Jesuit Mission, the program trains and empowers teachers, so they can deliver quality, life-changing education to students, while also working with the local Karenni Education Department to develop and improve the school curriculum, support school operations and distribute teaching and learning materials.

For children like nine-year-old Paw Meh, who was born in the Mae Hong Son camps, school is an island of stability that provides a feeling of normalcy and safety in an otherwise challenging environment.

"With our situation now and our uncertain future, we are just happy that in the camp there is good education," says Paw Meh's mother, who fled Myanmar with her husband over 10 years ago.

Paw Meh is thriving at school. She studies independently and is in the top three in her class – she even loves homework! Her selfless ambition to become a nurse motivates her to continue her studies and make her parents proud. "I like to take care of the sick," she says. "Especially old people, they are the ones who need the most help."



Emergency Relief

Jesuit Mission works with a global network of Jesuit partners to respond to communities devastated by conflict, humanitarian crises and natural disasters.

Our Emergency Action Fund created in 2020 allows us to act quickly and decisively in responding to some of the most vulnerable communities in the world.

Over five years we seek to build a fund of \$2 million to be able to respond quickly and effectively to immediate needs in an emergency as well as support ongoing rehabilitation, recovery and reconstruction.

Thanks to our trusted network of Jesuit partners, support in the form of clean water, sanitation, food, shelter, medicine, and clothing can occur in a matter of hours.

Since 2020 the Emergency Action fund has provided emergency relief to 14 countries. In so many instances, local communities faced with conflict and natural disasters like floods and earthquakes simply don't have the financial resources, or the people on the ground to take immediate action.

The creation of the Emergency Action Fund coincided with the COVID-19 pandemic and allowed immediate support to those affected in India, Myanmar, Timor-Leste and Cambodia.

Our Targets: Emergency Relief

- 1. Work closely with international Jesuit networks to fund responses to **humanitarian emergencies** and provide accompaniment to partners and affected communities.
- 2. Grow and maintain our **Emergency Action Fund** enabling Jesuit Mission to quickly respond to emergencies and the needs of affected communities.





Ukraine

"For years we have been suffering from social distancing. Finally, with this crisis, we are all witnessing and experiencing the importance of social proximity." – Fr Marius Talos SJ, Director of IRS Romania.

Since the war in the Ukraine started in February 2022, around eight million people have been forced to flee the country. They're predominantly vulnerable groups, including women, children, the elderly and people living with a disability or serious illness, who must now survive as refugees in foreign countries.

Another eight million are living as displaced people within Ukraine.

Responding to the emergency since the beginning, Jesuit Mission has partnered with the Xavier Network and Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) Europe to deliver emergency shelter, food and essential items, medical escorts, translation, and accompaniment to Ukrainian people in desperate need.

As this large-scale humanitarian crisis deepens, Jesuit Mission is committed to working as part of a global Jesuit response called 'The One Proposal' to ensure co-ordinated, effective action that accompanies and serves refugees fleeing the conflict.

A new beginning

The response of the global Jesuit community to the war in Ukraine has been inspiring. Around 10 million Euro has been committed by compassionate people around the world to implement large-scale immediate relief and long-term support projects for refugees and displaced people affected by the conflict.

As part of this worldwide movement of solidarity, Jesuit Mission supporters have helped enable JRS Europe to mobilise essential support for refugees across Europe – including Hungary, Poland, Romania, Slovakia, Macedonia – and displaced people within Ukraine.

This has been lifesaving for Ukrainian sisters and refugees Svetlana and Irina, who fled their homes near Odessa when war broke out in Ukraine.

"At first (in Ukraine) the sirens were used for training...we really didn't pay much attention. Then they told us that the situation was becoming serious. Then the tanks arrived and took position," says Irina.

"We started hearing in the news that children were dying and we made the decision to leave to save our children," adds Svetlana.

Svetlana and Irina crossed into Romania with their children, and with the support of JRS Romania, they are learning the language and beginning to settle into their new life.

Both sisters were educators in Ukraine, and have been employed by JRS Romania to teach Ukrainian children, keeping them engaged in learning as they adapt to their new country.

As they look towards their new futures the sisters are grateful for the holistic, ongoing support of JRS Romania, which is helping them to recover, rebuild and establish their new lives in Romania.

"Everyone is welcoming us. Not once during this time have I felt or seen anything negative... even in the supermarket strangers want to help," said Irina.

Myanmar

"Life here has become more difficult for all since the pandemic and the coup – and the people are being abused horribly. Since war was unleashed on the population in February 2021, the people have known no relief. In the townships and communities where we work, hunger is only too evident." – A Jesuit in Myanmar

The people of Myanmar are under attack. In February 2021, the military's proxy party suffered a crushing political defeat. In reaction, the military staged a coup to take over the country. Since then, homes, schools, churches, monasteries and public buildings have been pillaged and burned. Innocent children, women and men have been beaten, shot at and killed.

Tragically, anyone seen to be supporting displaced people faces real risks of violence and retribution.

Yet, with the support of Jesuit Mission, the Jesuits in Myanmar are using their strong, established Church and community networks to provide life-saving assistance to people that other international organisations cannot reach.

The Jesuits in Myanmar have been supporting our sisters and brothers in desperate need – providing food, medicines, shelter, livelihood support and emergency education.

While tending to immediate needs, the Jesuits are also looking for opportunities to promote education, so that the children are not losing time and progress in schooling, further compounding the impacts of the COVID pandemic.

At the same time the Jesuits are running livelihood programs – including micro-credit schemes and training programs – to better equip people to survive the current crisis and the aftermath that may take decades of recovery.


